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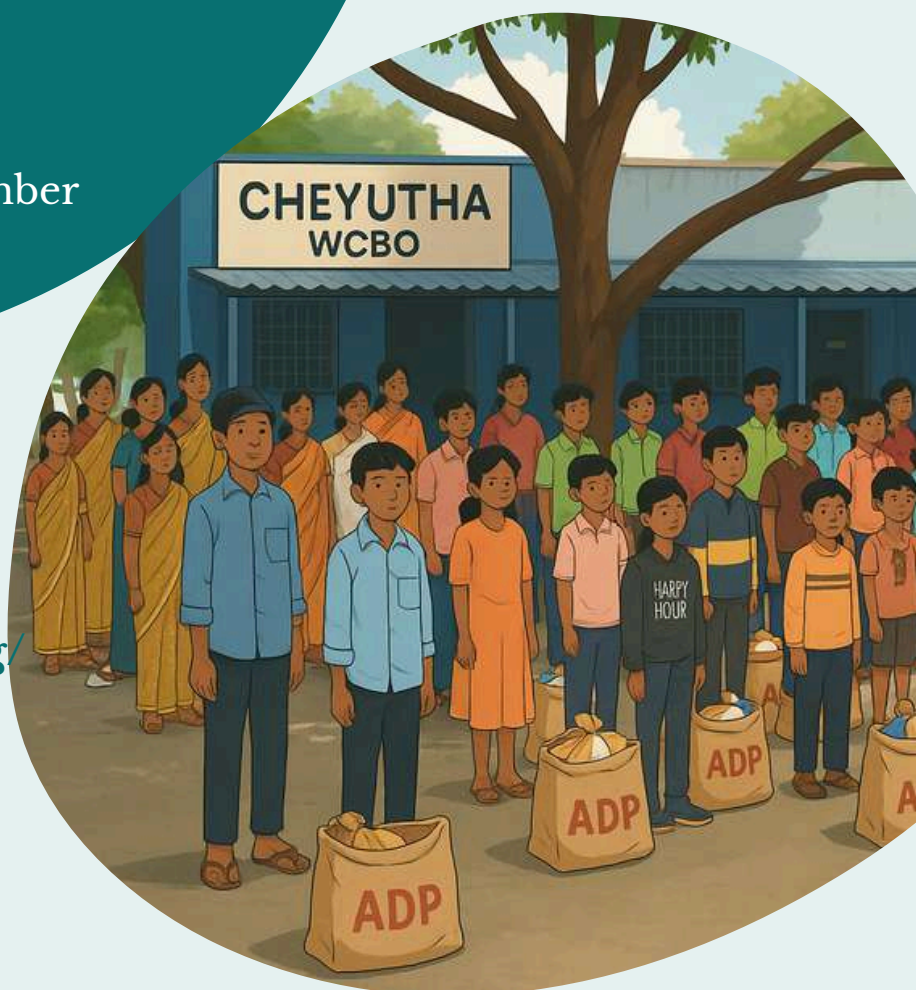

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From the Director's Desk



It is with deep reflection and renewed resolve that I present Cheyutha WCBO's Annual Report for the year 2024–2025.

This past year has been a mix of significant achievements and daunting challenges. As a small, grassroots community-based organization, we continue to operate independently without affiliations to state or national networks and yet, we have remained steadfast in our commitment to serve women, men and children Infected & Affected by HIV/AIDS. Our journey is marked not only by impact and innovation but also by the enduring struggle for recognition, sustainability, and support.

One of the most difficult challenges we faced this year was losing access to our office premises. For nearly eight months, working under constant pressure and uncertainty. These were months of sleepless nights, filled with efforts to reach out to political leaders, government officials, and partner organizations. While many appreciated the value of our work, securing even a rent-free office remained out of reach, highlighting the financial limitations we continue to navigate.

Yet, in the midst of this crisis, a ray of hope emerged. Our heartfelt thanks to Indian Red Cross Society, the Board and Members of the Society had given us timely support helped us overcome this critical challenge. Their generosity gave us renewed strength and allowed us to continue serving our community with dignity and purpose.

We are equally grateful to all our partners and donors who stood by us during this time. Your belief in our mission remains the foundation of our work, and it continues to bring hope and healing to those we serve.

Amid these challenges, we were honored to be selected as a partner for the Global Fund's CSC 2.0 project, in collaboration with the Telangana State AIDS Control Society (TGSACS), PR SATHI, and (our founding institution) LEPRASOCIETY.

This project introduced us to 12 new indicators that have expanded our understanding and response capacity. It also allowed us to offer tailored services to meet the specific needs of diverse community members.

Importantly, it enabled us to employ 24 individuals from the community, empowering them with livelihood opportunities while deepening our impact at the grassroots.

Unfortunately, the year also brought major setbacks. Two of our long-standing non-financial initiatives the Adolescent Friendly Health Clinics (AFHC) and our Jute Enterprises program were discontinued. AFHC came to a close due to a change in U.S. government funding policy. The Jute initiative, though deeply empowering for our women members, became financially unsustainable due to dwindling customer demand and rising costs. Continuing the enterprise would have resulted in a no-profit, no-loss scenario making it unviable for long-term sustainability.

Another significant change was the conclusion of our partnership with the Azim Premji Foundation, marking the end of a meaningful five-year engagement (April 2020 – March 2025). This project had a profound impact on our team, not just in terms of financial support, but also in strengthening our systems, leadership, and community engagement. In our final discussions, we shared our growing concern over the waning societal interest in HIV/AIDS issues and requested their continued support. Though the project concluded, the learning, humility, and groundedness of the Foundation's team left a lasting impression on us. Their approach was rare, respectful, and deeply empowering offering a model.

In response to these transitions, we began reaching out to new donors. Unfortunately, we found that many were reluctant to invest in HIV/AIDS-focused work, considering it a “solved” problem. But for us—and for the thousands still living with the virus—this work is far from over. We remain undeterred. Guided by the resilience of our team and the pressing needs of our community, we continue to pursue every opportunity to sustain and expand our work.

This year, TGSACS entrusted Cheyutha WCBO with the implementation of the non-financial CARG model (Community ART Refilling Groups). This has been a tremendous step forward. With many PLHIV community members regularly visiting our center for psychosocial and nutritional support, they can now also receive their ART medication from us. This has helped transform Cheyutha WCBO into a one-stop hub for holistic care and support exactly what we have envisioned.

On a personal note, one issue that continues to trouble me deeply is the policy that requires children to leave care homes upon turning 18. Many of these young people, especially those without any family support, are left vulnerable, emotionally fragile, and economically unstable.

Even those with single parents often struggle to survive. Many end up dropping out of school or college and find it extremely difficult to live independently. I strongly believe that both government and civil society need to step in with transitional support—helping these youth until they gain financial and emotional stability. Such interventions could truly empower them to build a life of dignity and self-reliance.

As we mark the conclusion of USAID support and reflect on our rich collaborations with FHI 360, ACCELERATE, and YRG Care, we are filled with gratitude for the knowledge, capacity, and experience these partnerships brought us. Though their formal support may have ended, the insights and strength we've gained will continue to guide our journey ahead.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my heartfelt gratitude to all our long-standing supporters and well-wishers. 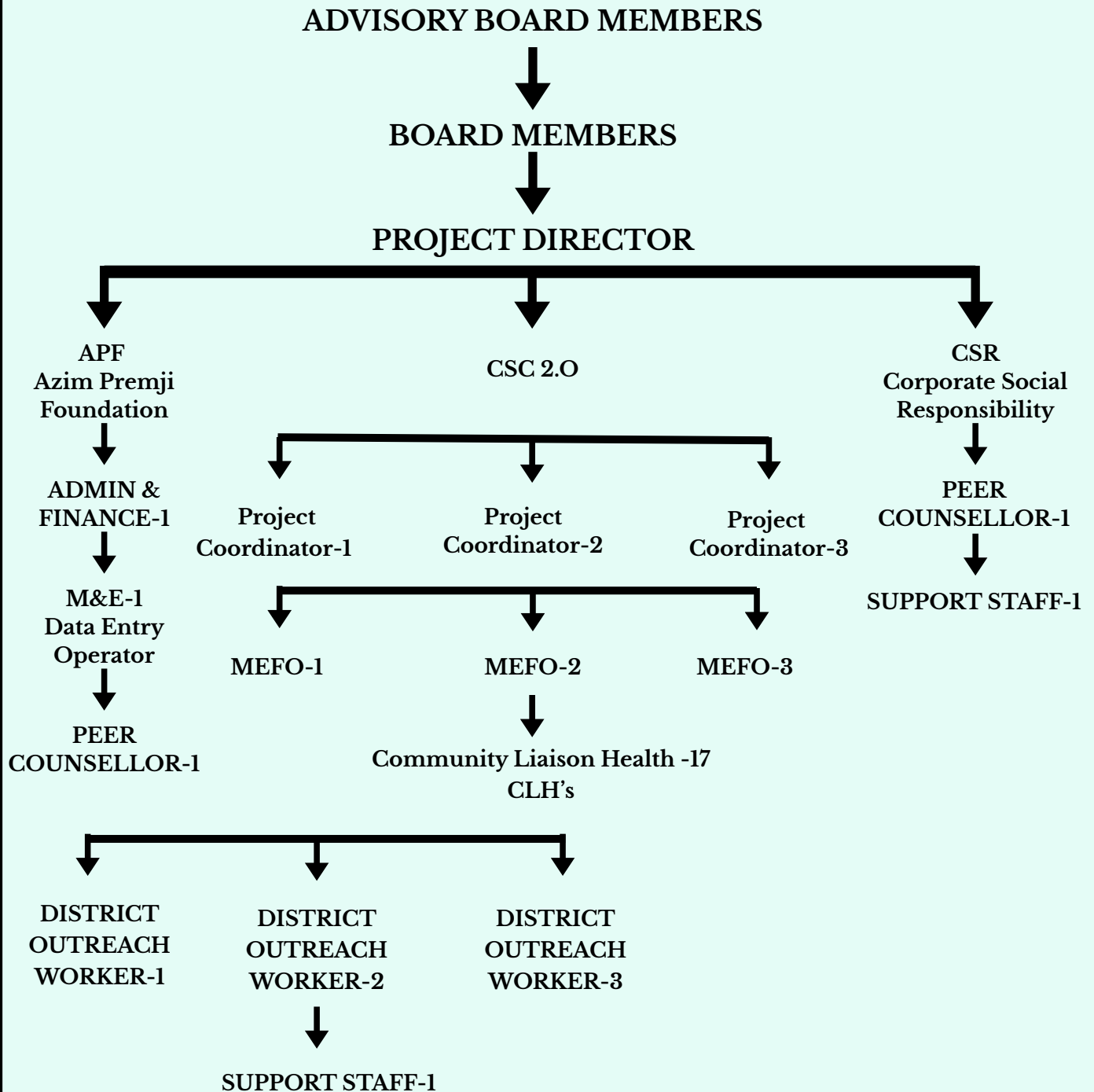

Highlights of the Year

Major projects

- **Achieving the GFATM CSC 2.0 Project:**

Under the Global Fund HIV Program (2024–27), the LEPRa Society (Sub-Recipient) has partnered with Cheyutha WCBO (Sub-Sub-Recipient) to implement the CSC 2.0 GFATM Project from December 2, 2024, to September 30, 2025.



The project supports India's progress towards the UNAIDS 95-95-95 goals by strengthening and expanding Care and Support Centers, including Elimination of Vertical Transmission of HIV and Syphilis (EVTHS). With a dedicated staff of 24, it also integrates HIV, TB, STI, syphilis, and viral hepatitis interventions, reaches incarcerated populations, engages community networks to reduce stigma, and promotes awareness through initiatives like the Red Ribbon Bus Campaign.



• CARG Model:

As Cheyutha WCBO we envisioned to provide a one-stop hub services for holistic care and support for our community members. On 30th November 2024, TSACS instructed CBOs, NGOs, and networks to establish Community ART Refill Groups (CARG) as per NACO guidelines to strengthen decentralized, community-based ART service delivery. Each group of 10–30 stable PLHIV is managed by a focal person linked to the ART center, who

collects medicines, monitors adherence, screens for TB/OIs, and coordinates follow-ups, while ART centers provide six-monthly clinical reviews and lab monitoring with long-standing experience in running clinics and members registered across different ART centers, Cheyutha WCBO has formally accepted the responsibility to establish and operate a CARG for Osmania General Hospital, serving general PLHIVs in line with the NACO ART Operational Guidelines 2019 and TGSACS SOPs. Initially, 15 members has enrolled as beneficiaries, with consent obtained and documented, they are receiving their ART medication along with other services.



• AFHC Project

AFHC was initiated through USAID, with the collaboration of YRG Care under ACCELERATE Project and which was non-financial, on 1st August 2021 and continued until 1 January 2025. Through this project, services were provided to adolescent children in 5 indicators [Treatment New, Virally Unsuppressed, Lost to Follow-Up (LFU), Self reported Opportunistic Infections (OI's), and Yet to be eligible for Viral load]. During the AFHC camps, both parents and children were linked to clinic-based services and received additional support including education assistance, nutritional support, moral counselling, and guidance to help them lead healthier lives.





Most of the registered children were orphans or semi-orphans, aged 10–17 years. Through the camps, we identified not only their health needs but also other urgent requirements. Some children faced physical abuse, some required medical emergency support, some needed educational assistance, and others needed legal support. Working with adolescents came with many learnings and challenges, as this is a sensitive age where multiple factors influence their development. Due to a government-related policy change, USAID required an urgent

closure of the AFHC project in January 2025.



• Jute Enterprise Project

The Jute Enterprise supported by USAID collaboration with EPIC FHI 360 and our founding organization LEPRASociety, as a non-financial initiative. Indian Red Cross Society by providing free space for the enterprise. USAID provided infrastructure, materials, and training to enhance the enterprise's development. They also supported online marketing efforts through a website platform, helping to promote product sales. This initiative aimed to strengthen the livelihoods of women in the organization, particularly those most needy, by offering them sustainable income-generating opportunities to support themselves and their children. Unfortunately, due to the change in government, USAID had to discontinue the project.

The Jute initiative, though deeply empowering for our women members, we thought it would become financially sustainable but due to dwindling customer demand and rising costs. Continuing the enterprise would have resulted in a no-profit, no-loss scenario making it unviable for long-term sustainability.

For the academic year 2024–2025 total 105 applications were received, out of which total of **92 students** received educational support.

The total budget mobilized was ₹4,71,000, contributed by generous donors including Ms. Sujatha Rao Garu (IAS, Retd.), Joy Group – St. Marks School 1992 batch, Mr. & Mrs. Usha Gummala Garu, Azim Premji Foundation, Change Foundation, Mr. M.L.Ashok Garu and others.

Guests praised Cheyutha WCBO’s dedication to empowering HIV-affected families through education and pledged continued support. The programme concluded with gratitude from Project Director Mrs. K. Laxmi Priya, a vote of thanks, and the national anthem, marking yet another milestone in Cheyutha WCBO’s mission to nurture hope and education among children in need.



The second phase of its Education Support Programme on 10th January 2025 at its Red Cross Hospital premises, supported by ADP CSR. the program successfully benefited 48 children, providing them with school and college fees, books, bags, and stationery. The event was graced by Mr. Vidyadhar (GAAMI Film Director), Mrs. Nanda (Mighty Sports & Health Care Adviser), and Dr. Arunabala (Medical Officer, Cheyutha WCBO). The program began with a ceremonial lamp lighting and “Vande Mataram” by foster care children. Project Director K. Laxmi Priya presented updates on Cheyutha WCBO’s initiatives, including the earlier education support held on 21st September 2024, and showcased beneficiary testimonials. Guests inspired the children through motivational speeches emphasizing education, health, and perseverance.



Event 2: World AIDS Day program: Cheyutha WCBO actively participated in World AIDS Day 2024 through various programs and collaborations.



Our team, along with CSC 2.0 staff, attended the state-level event organized by the Telangana AIDS Control Society in Vengal Rao Nagar. We also displayed our jute products at the Indore Community Booth, organized in collaboration with USAID and NACO, where we had the privilege of meeting the Hon'ble Union Minister of Health and family welfare,

Shri Jagat Prakash Nadda, and shared how social enterprises are impacting community members. We received an invitation from USAID to join the World AIDS Day celebrations organized by the Rishi Foundation in Bangalore, where our children and staff from the Adolescent Friendly Health Clinic Project participated.



On December 3, 2024, Cheyutha WCBO conducted its own World AIDS Day program in collaboration with YRG Care and the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA).

The event was graced by Smt. P. Sreedevi, Senior Civil Judge cum Secretary of DLSA, Rangareddy District, as Chief Guest, along with representatives from Accelerate, YRG Care, TGSACS, and community leaders. The program began with a ceremonial lamp lighting led by our President, Mrs. Swaroopa. During the discussions, Smt. P. Sreedevi assured support by coordinating with authorities to address community issues and promised to arrange visits by key officials. Mr. Rajinder (GIPA, TGSACS) also addressed concerns regarding discontinued ART pensions and committed to submitting applications and writing to SERP for reinstating eligible beneficiaries.



Event 3: International Women's Day

Cheyutha WCBO celebrated International Women's Day on April 9, 2025, with dignitaries including Mr. T. Venkateswarlu (State Program Manager, CSC 2.0), Mrs. Manjusha (Advocate, High Court), Mrs. Surekha Rani (Holy Mary School), and Ms. Manaswi (BA LLB Hons).

The event honored women through the distribution of SER loans and sewing machines to support their livelihoods and showcased Cheyutha's key services such as education support, legal aid, nutrition, health camps, and CSC 2.0 initiatives.



Inspiring speeches highlighted the role of women and assured continued legal and community support. Outstanding CLHs were felicitated for their dedication, while beneficiary stories of resilience were shared. The program concluded with gratitude to all guests and a renewed commitment to empowering women in the community.

The Women's Day program was made possible through generous contributions, including ₹20,000 from APF and ₹20,000 from Mrs. T. Mala Thiagarajan, ₹22,500 from Ms. Manaswi, and ₹72,000 from APF towards sewing machines. In-kind support was also extended by Mrs. Unnathi and Mr. Paandu. In total, contributions amounted to ₹1,34,500/-



Programs & Impact

Program 1 - Clinical Care & Referral Program:

Cheyutha WCBO is well known for its clinical services. Compared to other HIV community members, those registered with Cheyutha WCBO are less prone to opportunistic infections due to early diagnosis and proper guidance.



Many members have been identified early with conditions like cancer, TB, diabetes, and other co-infections are guided to the right treatment and referred to government or non-government hospitals, when surgeries or special care are needed.

The ongoing counseling and Follow up by Cheyutha WCBO, to its members to retain on the ART and to maintain the adherence.



With the support of Dr. Padmaja Garu and her family (Satya Sai Seva devotees), members receive free medicines - prophylaxis treatment. This not only helps them stay healthy and virally suppressed but also reduces their financial burden of buying medicines from outside.

Program 2 - Foster Care (Nutrition & Health):

Children living with HIV often face emotional and mental health challenges such as depression, anxiety, loneliness, and stigma. Many lose one or both parents, miss out on play and social activities, and struggle with the changes of growing up while hiding their condition out of fear of rejection. We are deeply grateful to Value Labs for supporting 15 children and ADP Pvt. Ltd. for their continuous support to 50 orphan and semi-orphan children infected and affected by HIV.



With their help, the children receive proper care, nutrition, and emotional support. This has led to visible improvements in their health, including better growth in height and weight, stronger immunity, and viral load suppression.

Program 3 - Support Group:

Support group meetings are held once a month, on the second Thursday, with around 150 members attending regularly. A total of 12 meetings were conducted during the year. These gatherings provide a safe platform for members to connect with others who share similar experiences and challenges such as health issues, financial struggles, and emotional stress. Over time, members have begun to open up, share their stories, and speak as positive role models. They are also updated with the latest information and research related to HIV and AIDS, while encouraging others from the community to join this year, several new members were enrolled. Members are motivated to save a small portion of their income, ranging from ₹100 to ₹200, from their ART or widow pensions. ,

During meetings, they also benefit from free doctor consultations, prophylaxis treatment and nutrition support (half a kilogram each of peanuts, sesame seeds, and jaggery) provided by Mr. Vasu Garu from Ranganath Rao Foundation (RRF).



Program 4 - Why Education Support needed for our community children?

Cheyutha WCBO believes that education can light the path from darkness to hope. Education gives these children the chance to build a better life, become independent, and break free from the cycle of poverty and discrimination. When one child is educated, a life changes—but when many are educated, the whole community is uplifted. With the help of kind-hearted donors: Azim Premji Foundation (APF), ADP, Change Foundation, Mr. & Mrs. Usha Gummala, Joy Group and M.L.Ashok Kumar.

Total Applications received for the Academic year 2024-2025 for education support: 105

- Student's Academic performance: **Total 92 students** were supported for the education for the academic year 2024-2025.

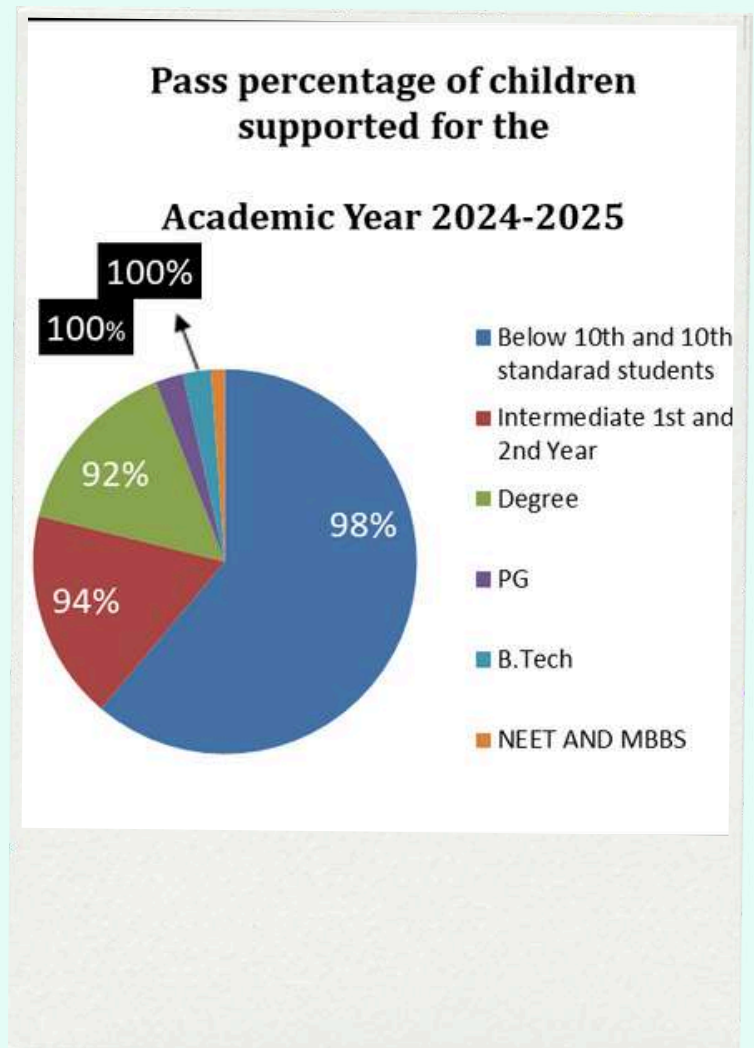
- The pie chart shows the 92 children into **06 categories** and their pass percentage:

- Below 10th Standard & 10th standard: **57 students** were supported out of them **56 students passed [98%]**

- Intermediate: **16 students** were supported out of them **15 students passed, 1 student failed [94%]**

- Degree: **13 students** were supported out of them **12 students passed, 1 student failed [92%]**

- Post-Graduation: **02 students** were supported out of them **02 students passed [100%]**
- B.Tech: **02 students** was supported out of them **02 students passed [100%]**
- NEET and MBBS: **1 student passed** and the other student wants to take **2nd drop for NEET [50%]**.



Emergency Support

Emergency support is often required for our HIV-positive members. The District Outreach Worker (DOR) office provides various types of assistance to those facing health-related challenges. Members receive support for blood transfusions and are referred to appropriate departments such as TB, Dermatology, ENT, Gynecology, Neurology, Orthopedics, and others as needed. In cases requiring surgery or specialized care, they are referred to Gandhi Hospital or linked with other organizations like UNCRIIOUS for additional support.



Positive Marriage

Cheyutha WCBO believes that every person living with HIV has the right to get married. Unfortunately, HIV-positive individuals often face social stigma and discrimination within their families and communities, which can lead to mental distress and isolation. When Cheyutha WCBO receives such referrals, the team provides counseling and guidance to both individuals. Once a suitable match is found, the couple is counseled on treatment adherence and measures to prevent HIV transmission to the newborn. As a result, most of the children born to these couples are HIV-negative.

These marriages not only strengthen emotional bonds but also improve the overall quality of life for the partners. In the past year, Cheyutha WCBO has facilitated four such marriages, helping couples lead lives of dignity and respect.



Legal AID Support

Cheyutha WCBO community members often face denial of their basic rights and experience severe stigma and discrimination, leaving them without proper support. The main issues they encounter include denial of the right. When such members approach Cheyutha WCBO, they receive counseling and guidance to help them secure their rights. Some cases are referred to the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) for legal support, especially when court intervention is required. Although the documentation and legal process take time, community members often go through significant trauma during this period. Meanwhile, Cheyutha WCBO conducts to educate and empower members on how to handle such situations effectively.



Board Induction Training

APF has supported the organization in its overall development. As part of this support, an Induction Training Program was conducted for the Board Members, facilitated by Dr. Anand Kumar Pal (M.S.W., M.Phil., Ph.D.), a research scholar, data analysis expert, and project writing consultant. Through this training, the board members enhanced their understanding and skills for effective organizational management and development.



Uni-Corpus Mega Camp

As part of our healthcare initiatives, Cheyutha WCBO conducted a medical camp in collaboration with Unicorpus Health Foundation and India Medical Mission. A total of 358 members of Cheyutha participated in the camp, which included general health check-ups, blood sugar and blood pressure tests, blood investigations, eye, and dental check-ups. Members actively participated and received valuable medical support through this initiative on June 26th Wednesday 2024



Before the camp, members were counseled, and their consent was taken to participate. Initially, many members were hesitant and fearful about undergoing screening. A total of 107 women successfully availed the cancer screening services during this camp.

Cervical Cancer Screening Camp

As part of its healthcare initiatives, Cheyutha WCBO is deeply committed to promoting the health and well-being of women and children, believing that good health is essential for a better quality of life. In this context, Cheyutha WCBO, in collaboration with Swastava Cancer Care, Indian Red Cross Society and MNJ Cancer Hospital (RCC), organized a cancer screening camp on 11th July 2024. Members were screened for oral, breast, and cervical cancer.

Success Stories

Case Study: “A Ray of Hope for Rani”

Background: K. Rani, (Name Changed) a 17-year-old girl from Kakinada, Andhra Pradesh, has endured immense hardships since childhood. Abandoned by her father in infancy, she was raised single-handedly by her mother, who struggled to provide for her. Mary Rani also suffered from a severe hearing impairment that went untreated, eventually forcing her to discontinue her schooling.

Challenges: While seeking treatment for her hearing condition at a private hospital in Kakinada, doctors planned surgery. However, pre-surgery tests revealed that Rani was living with HIV contracted unknowingly from her parents.



The hospital immediately canceled the procedure, and news of her HIV status spread in the community, leading to stigma, discrimination, and social isolation. This forced the family to leave their home and move to Telangana.

Intervention: In Telangana, Rani began ART treatment at Gandhi Hospital, where Mrs. Laxmi Bai, a dedicated Community Care Facilitator (CCF), took keen interest in her case. With limited response from Gandhi Hospital for her ear condition, the CCF referred her to the Adolescent Friendly Health Clinic (AFHC). With continuous follow-up by the Case Manager Mrs. Sangeetha and guidance from the Project Director Mrs. K.Laxmi Priya, Rani was referred to Word and Deed Hospital, where specialists confirmed that surgery could restore her hearing

Financial Support: The estimated cost of surgery for both ears was ₹2,50,000, far beyond the family's capacity. Through donor support, ₹1,00,000 was sponsored by Mr. Aditya ACCELERATE and ₹20,000 by Mr. Prabhakar, State Manager, YRG Care, totaling ₹1,20,000. With these funds, Rani successfully underwent surgery for one ear.

Outcome: Thanks to the generosity of donors and the relentless support of facilitators, Rani's hearing has significantly improved after her first surgery. She is now healthy, happy, and hopeful about her future, awaiting further support to undergo surgery on her second ear.

Strength in Adversity: Case Study of Mrs. Sunitha’s Family”

Background: Mrs. Sunitha (name changed) married Mr. Sunil in 2013. The couple shared a stable and positive relationship. In 2018, they were blessed with a baby girl, who is now 7 years old. Both husband and wife have been on regular Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) and have been maintaining good adherence to their treatment.

Present Problem: Recently, Mr. Sunil started experiencing severe pain in his lower back and hips. He underwent medical investigations at the Government Hospital (GH) ART Centre, where doctors found his creatinine levels to be significantly high. Further diagnosis revealed that both his kidneys were damaged, and he was advised to start dialysis immediately. This sudden health condition led to severe financial and emotional difficulties for the family. Mr. Sunil’s inability to work and the cost of ongoing dialysis created a major burden, affecting their daily living and overall well-being.

Referral and Registration: One of Cheyutha WCBO’s support group members, Mrs. Jyothi—who also collects ART medicines from GH—came to know about Mrs. Sunitha’s difficult situation. She referred the family to Cheyutha WCBO for support.

In April 2024, Mrs. Sunitha and her husband visited the Cheyutha WCBO office and met the Project Director. After explaining their challenges, they were registered as members of the organization.

Intervention by Cheyutha WCBO: After registration, the organization provided immediate assistance to the family through, Emergency Nutrition Support, Regular supply of nutritional kits to help maintain the family’s health.

Medical Support: Guidance and consultation regarding Mr. Sunil’s ongoing dialysis treatment.

Educational Assistance: Support for their daughter’s schooling to ensure her continued education.

When Mr. Sunil’s condition worsened and he was hospitalized twice within a month at Gandhi Hospital due to increased creatinine levels, Cheyutha WCBO continued to stand by the family, extending consistent medical, nutritional, and educational support.

Outcome: The timely intervention from Cheyutha WCBO helped reduce the family’s distress and improved their ability to manage the crisis. Despite ongoing challenges, Mrs. Sunitha continues to work as a domestic worker to support her husband and daughter..



The support from Cheyutha WCBO has enabled her to continue her husband’s treatment and ensure that her daughter’s education is not interrupted. The case highlights the importance of community-based support and timely intervention in improving the quality of life of families affected by chronic illness and poverty

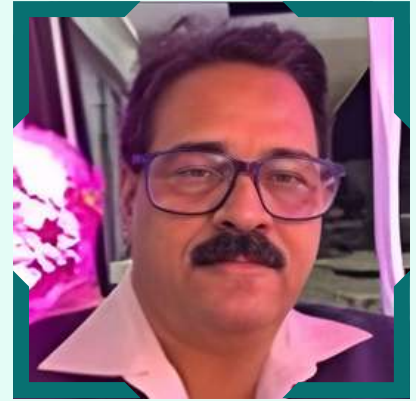

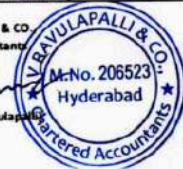
